


What is Biological Anthropology?

What is Public Health?









Public Health is an interdisciplinary field in which the goals are to prevent disease, improve overall wellness, and expand health-related knowledge within human communities.

How does Biological Anthropology approach matters of Public Health differently?



* Human populations evolve cultural, behavioral, and biological adaptations to fit their environments.

Disease results when human biology and behavior are maladapted to modern environments and new cultural practices.

Diseases can be prevented by understanding human biology in terms of evolutionary ecology.

Conventional Medicine:

* Adaptive responses to the environment and cultural influences on human biology tend to be ignored.

* Health is evaluated by comparing the structure and function of an individual's body systems to what is average for most humans.

Standard treatments are given to all patients with a focus on immediate care rather than disease prevention and wellness.

What career options exist in Public Health?

* Occupational Therapist: Rehabilitate patients recovering from illnesses, injuries, addictions, and trauma; persons with disabilities; and new refugees in their professional and daily living activities by recommending alternative means to perform tasks, employer accommodations, and the use of adaptive equipment.

JOBS

- * Community Health Worker: Document health concerns for specific subpopulations within a community, conduct outreach efforts to increase awareness of and access to healthcare services; and keep data on feedback.
- * Clinical Research Coordinator: Oversee clinical research projects by instructing study employees on objectives and methods, managing subject enrollment, maintaining records, and ensuring protocol compliance.
- * Biostatistician: Collaborate with physicians and scientists to design studies; apply statistical methods to analyze surveys and clinical data; and form conclusions and predictive models on the basis of statistical results.
- **Epidemiologist:** Investigate and describe the etiology and distribution of human diseases by collecting data through interviews, surveys, and biological samples and assessing demographic trends to define high-risk segments of the population, establish effective treatments, and reduce negative health outcomes.

Job Entry Requirements:

- * Master of Public Health
- * Anthropology, BS (with emphasis on Biological Anthropology) is good preparation.
 - The two degrees fit together well, because you are trained in science but are also more culturally aware than most science graduates.

Advantages & Disadvantages of this Career:

- * Pay is not great, though some directors can make upwards of \$100k.
- Great benefits for government jobs.
- The Bureau of Labor Statistics predicts that job opportunities will increase by 12-23% in the next ten years, making growth as fast as average or much faster than average.



Advantages & Disadvantages of this Career:

- * Many international job opportunities.
- * \$65,000 median annual wage.
- * \$70,000 to \$130,00 for Epidemiologists at the CDC.
- * Job competition is intense while job growth in Epidemiology remains average.
- Risk of exposure to the Public Health threats that one studies.



Genetics

"...[Anthropological Geneticists seek to] understand human genetic and biological variation and human evolution, and to reconstruct human population history and demographic history..."

Skills:

- Molecular biology
- * DNA sequencing, mapping, gene frequency and expression
- * Lab techniques: sampling, measuring, processing, tests, and analysis
- * Statistical data
- * Problem solving, critical thinking, and researching/investigating

Highest level of Education to be successful:

- * Masters BS/A
- Ph.D for higher positions/salary



Genetics Careers

1. CDC: Interdisciplinary Behavioral Scientist

* \$124,995-\$157,100/year

Requirements:

- * BA/S or Higher
- * Experience related to appropriate position or work

2. Thermo Fisher: Next-Gen Sequencing, CA

* \$60,000 - \$78,000/year

Requirements:

- * BS + 6 yrs. experience, Master's + 4 yrs. experience, or PhD
- Familiar with sequencing technology

3. Genetic Counselor

- * \$48,000 \$71,000/year
- * Determine risks for disorders and diseases that are hereditary in patients.

Requirements:

- * Masters or higher
- Licensing is required in some states

Forensic Anthropology

- * Forensic anthropology is the application of anthropology, osteology and other forensic sciences to the legal process.
- * Forensic anthropology is used in legal settings to identify human remains and the context of death.
- * Forensic anthropologist do NOT do any of the following: collect trace evidence (hair, fibers), run DNA tests, analyze ballistics or weapon evidence, analyze blood spatter, conduct autopsies







